

Communion for the Homebound: When we come together to pray at our Eucharistic liturgy, we do not forget the members of our community who are unable to be with us because of ill health. We remember them in our prayers, and we wish to include them in our Holy Communion. Members of our community bring the Blessed Sacrament to them to comfort them and to unite us in the Eucharist. We are not always aware of those who have this need. Please call the Parish Office to let us know if you or a member of your family would like to have Holy Communion brought to them. That way we can schedule a time for our ministers to visit and bring the Sacrament.

Hospital, Nursing Home, Homebound Visits: Churches are no longer notified by hospitals or nursing homes when a parishioner is admitted unless the family has requested it. If you or a family member are homebound, hospitalized or in a nursing home and would like a visit from a member of the ministry staff, please call the Parish Office.



Jesus Has Broken Into Our Experience and Gives Us New Life

Imagine what it would have been like to be Mary of Magdala, Peter, or John in the gospel story. They could not possibly have anticipated what happened. They had spent so much time with their Master and Teacher whom they loved. They had found great hope in he who brought healing and showed them how to live. But now they wanted to put closure on what had been an exciting time in their lives. Anointing his dead body was to be a last loving gesture. It was the least that Mary of Magdala could do. When have we had life take a cruel turn? When have we faced the stone in front of us and asked, "Who will roll the stone back for us?" When have we felt that

something important to us was taken away?


Jesus really was dead and crucified and there really was finality to it – or so it seemed. Sometimes it can seem that way to us because, after all, our lives end the same way – in the grave. But, in reality, this is not the end! God has broken into the tragic human drama and reversed what had seemed like the inevitable. God raised Jesus from the dead! God has broken into our human experience of moving on to the next exciting thing that grabs our attention and has charted a course for us that will last forever.

Jesus says it himself: "You seek Jesus of Nazareth, the crucified." How about us? Do we seek Jesus, the crucified when we are tempted to despair over a tragic event in our lives, when we cannot exactly find our way in life and we know it, or when we are tempted to simply move on from religion? Yet, In Jesus, the crucified, God has acted definitively and pulls us out of a life doomed to the grave where we are only self-absorbed in what we can touch, see, hear, taste, and smell. Our Lord Jesus is not in our past. He is not in the grave. He is ahead of us waiting to be with us each time death appears to have won a victory. Peter, the other disciples and the women all received new life and new reason for hope as they saw and believed. Then they allowed themselves to be led by Him.

As we come to the empty tomb today, may this hope always be ours! Let us trust in this reality in the way we love and serve each other, and in our choice to love God. Then the one who has conquered death will pull us up and into the fullness of life. Have a great Easter and God bless you all!

On the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala came to the tomb early in the morning, while it was still dark, and saw the stone removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and to the other disciple whom Jesus loved, and told them, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they put him." So Peter and the other disciple went out and came to the tomb. They both ran, but the other disciple ran faster than Peter and arrived at the tomb first; he bent down and saw the burial cloths there, but did not go in. When Simon Peter arrived after him, he went into the tomb and saw the burial cloths there, and the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place. Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first, and he saw and believed. For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead.

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
