

THE GOOD SAMARITAN—A PERSONAL STORY

The story of the Good Samaritan is so well-known that it has achieved proverbial status. For example, we speak of "Good Samaritan" laws. But perhaps we haven't thought of how deeply personal this story is. We might be like the man who attempted to justify himself, asking, "Who is my neighbor?" In today's day, we have the situation of the foreigner in our midst with those coming from Mexico and other countries in search of a viable means to provide for their families. While we recognize the right of nations to regulate their borders in an orderly and humane manner, we recognize the need to attend to the stranger and thus fulfill the greatest commandment. The following is what The Catholic bishops of the United States and Mexico, in communion with the Holy Father, Saint John Paul II, in his 1995 World Migration Day message, affirmed:

"In the Church no one is a stranger, and the Church is not foreign to anyone, anywhere. As a sacrament of unity and thus a sign and a binding force for the whole human race, the Church is the place

where illegal immigrants are also recognized and accepted as brothers and sisters. It is the task of the various Dioceses actively to ensure that these people, who are obliged to live outside the safety net of civil society, may find a sense of brotherhood in the Christian community. Solidarity means taking responsibility for those in trouble. The Church must, therefore, welcome all persons regardless of race, culture, language, and nation with joy, charity, and hope. It must do so with special care for those who find themselves—regardless of motive—in situations of poverty, marginalization, and exclusion.

We can see Christ himself as the Samaritan. He does not overlook our needs, but always tends to our wounds and our needs. And then we can see Christ in the wounded man. We can see Christ in the foreigner who is wounded economically in search of a viable means to provide for his family. Who was the victim's neighbor? The one who treated him with mercy, says the questioning man. We are servants of Christ who he tells as he did the questioning man, "Go and do likewise."

EL BUEN SAMARITANO: UNA HISTORIA PERSONAL

La historia del Buen Samaritano es tan conocida que ha alcanzado el estatus de proverbial. Por ejemplo, hablamos de leyes del "buen samaritano". Pero tal vez no hemos pensado en cuán profundamente personal es esta historia. Podríamos ser como el hombre que trató de justificarse, preguntando: "¿Quién es mi prójimo?" En la jornada de hoy tenemos entre nosotros la situación del extranjero con los que vienen de México y otros países en busca de un medio viable para mantener a sus familias. Si bien reconocemos el derecho de las naciones a regular sus fronteras de manera ordenada y humana, reconocemos la necesidad de atender al extranjero y así cumplir el mayor mandamiento. Lo siguiente es lo que afirmaron los obispos católicos de Estados Unidos y México, en comunión con el Santo Padre, San Juan Pablo II, en su mensaje del Día Mundial de la Migración de 1995:

En la Iglesia nadie es extraño, y la Iglesia no es ajena a nadie, en ningún lugar. Como sacramento de unidad y, por tanto, signo y fuerza vinculante para todo el género humano, la Iglesia es el lugar donde también los inmigrantes ilegales son reconocidos y acogidos como hermanos y hermanas. Corresponde a las distintas diócesis velar activamente para que estas personas, obligadas a vivir fuera de la red de seguridad de la sociedad civil, encuentren un sentido de fraternidad en la comunidad cristiana. Solidaridad significa hacerse responsable de los que están en problemas. La Iglesia debe, por tanto, acoger con alegría, caridad y esperanza a todas las personas, independientemente de su raza, cultura, lengua y nación. Debe hacerlo con especial cuidado por quienes se encuentran —cualquiera que sea el motivo— en situaciones de pobreza, marginación y exclusión.

Podemos ver a Cristo mismo como el samaritano. Él no pasa por alto nuestras necesidades, sino que siempre atiende nuestras heridas y nuestras necesidades. Y entonces podemos ver a Cristo en el hombre herido. Podemos ver a Cristo en el extranjero herido económicamente que busca un medio viable para mantener a su familia. ¿Quién era el vecino de la víctima? El que lo trató con misericordia, dice el interrogador. Somos siervos de Cristo a quien le dice como lo hizo con el hombre que le preguntaba: "Ve y haz tú lo mismo".

We will Regroup Now and Focus on a Capital Campaign

Dear Parishioners,

I want to update you on the latest on the sale. We have declined the sale to Community Asset Development Group at this time for several reasons. In addition to receiving a lowered offer amount, we have discovered more cost associated with renovating the friary.

We have been recently made aware that we must install a fire-suppression sprinkler system in the church in order to renovate because the former friary building is considered one building with the church. The cost for this is an estimated \$225,000-\$300,000. We currently are awaiting word from a contractor as to an exact bid for his services to install it. We also are subject to a fee instituted by the Metropolitan Council for sewer and water availability, otherwise known as SAC and WAC fees, to help pay for recent significant upgrades to existing regional lines. We need to get a better estimate, but the preliminary estimate is that we will be subject to fees of approximately \$140,000. Third, our funds raised for a capital campaign will be subject to a 2% assessment by the Archdiocese. (On a \$1.7 million campaign, this would amount to \$34.000.)

Additionally, as I mention above, our prospective buyer, CADG, had communicated in mid-May that it was necessary to lower their original offer to \$1.1 million because they had relied on the prospects of developing a four-story apartment building on our school playground area and of selling our gymnasium to the city. Such a four-story building did not receive sufficient support from the city nor did the city deem it best to buy our gymnasium with its aging buildings for community events in its portfolio.

I held a meeting on June 14th in which 38 parishioners attended. Many expressed a need to regroup, verify the costs to renovate, and promote the capital campaign side of our goal to renovate the friary before we sell our property south of 2nd Street. We were faced with a deadline of June 21st to affirm or decline the buyer's offer. I sent notice that we were declining the offer at this time due to a need to begin raising money first before selling, which, as you well know, would leave us with need to rent office space (we were planning on renting the convent back from the buyer after selling it to them).

We will get a better estimate of our renovation costs this summer by obtaining engineering-level drawings from Vanman Architects and Builders of Saint Louis Park. We plan to begin with a feasibility study for our capital campaign, perhaps this late-August. After completion of the feasibility study which should take place in about two months, we will have better knowledge of all of our costs. Right now, the estimate is \$2.75 million. The proceeds of our sale would have been about \$985,000. We will try to do better than that in the future, but it may be that we will do a little worse. It could go either way. Then, after the feasibility study, assuming that everything is going well, the next step would be to begin the capital campaign with the pledging phase. This phase is typically completed in about three months. Then, we would collect on these pledges for the foreseeable future.

In order to break ground for renovation, a project which will take an estimated 13 months to complete, we must have 50% cash in hand and 100% of the projected cost of the project pledged. This will very likely mean that we must sell the property that we were planning on in order to gain the 50% cash. The timing in which we would do this depends on how well-supported the campaign is and how well our collection is going. It will be a long journey, but the goal of updating one of our buildings for our parish life and becoming very efficient in the process is well-worth it. May the Holy Spirit lead us always as we seek to be a revitalized presence of God's community in the Chaska-Carver area.
