

BEHOLD, THE LAMB OF GOD!



"Lamb of God, you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us, grant us peace." We say these words at every Mass. They repeat the words of John the Baptist that we hear in the gospel today. Even though these words are heard often, we have to admit that they have become somewhat foreign to us. We do know how a lamb looks, even though many of us have not spent much time on a farm. But what does this description of this strong young man, a son of a carpenter, mean?

Every day lambs were offered as sacrifices in the Temple in Jerusalem, and to this day a

lamb is eaten at the meal on the Jewish feast of Passover, which recalls the night of the Exodus from slavery in Egypt. So "Lamb of God" means the sacrifice that is offered to God for reconciliation and liberation. This on whom John calls the "Lamb of God" is referred to by John as the one who will take away the sinns of the world.

These mysterious words about Jesus predict his entire future path. He will travel this path, not with great political success, or with great military conquests, but rather "like a lamb that is led to slaughter" (Isaiah 53:7). But in this way, seemingly with powerlessness, he will lift the entire burden of evil that weighs heavily on the world. This burden is the burden of war, injustice, and hate that the Bible calls "sin," which Jesus loaded upon himself and took away.

The problems of our lives and our world do not seem to always have clear and happy endings, but we are nonetheless part of God's miraculous activity. We, like John the Baptist, are part of God's salvation story. John the Baptist and the prophet Isaiah have this kind of keen vision. This one is like a lamb, the beloved Son, with whom the Father is well-pleased. We begin the Church year and He invites us to gather at his feet and listen to Him. Then, as believers in the power of God that is like a lamb, we can truly be testifiers to this mystery as a people of hope for ourselves, our community, our country, and our world.

In Memoriam POPE EMERITUS BENEDICT XVI

April 16, 1927 – December 31, 2022

Papacy: April 19, 2005 – February 28, 2013

Joseph Alois Ratzinger was born in Marktl am Inn, Bavaria, on April 16, 1927—Holy Saturday and baptized that same day—the first person baptized in the new Easter water. It was a sign of blessing, he wrote in a memoir, that his life from the beginning was thus immersed in the Easter mystery. He entered the minor seminary in 1939 at the age of twelve, but his studies were interrupted by World War II, when the seminary was closed and Joseph, along with most of his class, was drafted into the army at the age of sixteen.

After the war he resumed his education in philosophy and theology, and together with his brother, Georg, was ordained a priest in 1951. During the course of a twenty-year career as a professor of dogma and theology at several German universities, he earned a reputation as a gifted lecturer and learned scholar, and was present as a *peritus*, or theological advisor, at all four sessions of the Second Vatican Council.

He was ordained an archbishop in May of 1977 and elevated to the College of Cardinals a month later. He settled in Rome in 1981 and went on to become one of the most influential men in the Roman curia. Of the many offices he held, he was best known as the Prefect of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, an authoritative advisor on doctrinal issues during his predecessor's pontificate. When he was elected the 265th successor of Peter in 2005 at the age of seventy-eight, he became the first German pope since Victor II in the eleventh century. A central theme of his papacy was the staunch defense of core Christian values against what he saw as moral decline across much of Europe. At the same time, he sought to improve relations with other religions, trying to determine if a "cultural synthesis" was possible without losing the identity of the faith while engaged in discourse with the Lutheran World Federation, Judaism, Islam, the Anglican Communion, and Christian Orthodox Churches. He also spoke out against human rights abuses and ongoing political conflicts and warfare, and advocated better protection of the environment. He called for a radical rethinking of the global economy, criticizing the growing divide between rich and poor, and pressed for a "true world political authority" to oversee the economy and work for the common good.

Ever true to his episcopal motto, "Fellow Worker in the Truth," Pope Benedict XVI's teaching and prolific writings always defended traditional Catholic doctrine and values.

On February 11, 2013, Pope Benedict XVI announced that on February 28, 2013, he would resign as supreme pontiff due to his advanced age and deteriorating health and that a conclave would be convened shortly thereafter to elect a new pope. He returned to Rome and remained there as Pope Emeritus after Jorge Bergoglio succeeded him as Bishop of Rome.

Eternal rest grant unto him, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him.
